Three things I fear is being alone, not making it out of this city, and feeling like I'm losing my mother's trust.

Some advice I would give to other people like me is be true to yourself, stay focused on your goals, and let nobody knock you off your path.

What programs or people helped me get to where I'm now, I wanna say thank you to everyone that worked with me while I was downstairs. You guys push me to wanna succeed in life. My judge put faith in me and giving me a chance to prove I can come. Karen for always believing in me.

I feel like it could've been smoother if the court process wasn't so long. If I went to a group home, I might been already back home. I feel like, if I never went through what I did go through, I would never be the person I'm today.

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
